







Learning areas, subjects, strands

- The learning areas of English, Mathematics, Science, Health and Physical Education comprise a single subject.
- The learning areas of Humanities and Social Sciences, The Arts, Technologies and Languages each comprise multiple subjects.
- Within each learning area or subject, the largest structural unit for content is a strand.
- Typically strands are further divided into sub-strands and/or threads, which are populated with content descriptions.

Humanities and Social Sciences

Includes five subjects :


F-6/7 HASS. 7-10 Civics and Citizenship, 7-10 Economics and Business, 7-10 Geography and 7-10 History.

- The Civics and Citizenship curriculum is all about ensuring students have the skills and values to become active and informed citizens. Students will investigate political and legal systems, and explore the nature of citizenship, diversity and identity in contemporary society.

Year 9

- The Year 9 curriculum builds students' understanding of Australia's political and court systems.
- The civics and citizenship content at this year level involves two strands:
 - civics and citizenship knowledge and understanding, and
 - civics and citizenship skills.

These strands are interrelated and have been developed to be taught in an integrated way, and in ways that are appropriate to specific local contexts.

Citizenship, diversity and identity

- Looks at how and why individuals and groups participate in and contribute to civic life.
 - It is at this level that the proposed lesson could be integrated into the classroom learning activities
- 

Junior secondary students are expected to :

- research the work of a non-government organisation, philanthropist, community group or religious group: how and why they contribute to the Australian community
- explore ways individuals contribute to civic life (for example, by volunteering services to charities & service groups, becoming a JP, making submissions to public enquiries, serving on local government bodies and providing voluntary help at schools and nursing homes)
- discuss how the Australian Honours System recognises, celebrates and says 'thank you' to those who make a difference and serve others
- understand how the Australian Honours System works, including the types of awards and how they are announced and presented

The Order of Australia



The Order of Australia is an order of chivalry established on 14 February 1975 by Queen Elizabeth II, Queen of Australia.

It's about recognising those people in the community whose service and contributions have had the effect of making a significant difference to Australian life or, more broadly, to humanity at large.



INSIGNIA DESIGN



THE DESIGN FOR THE INSIGNIA WAS CONCEIVED BY MR STUART DEVLIN AO CMG IN 1976. USING THE LIVERY COLOURS OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF AUSTRALIA COAT OF ARMS—GOLD AND ROYAL BLUE—HE TRANSLATED AN INDIVIDUAL BALL OF WATTLE BLOSSOM INTO A SIMPLE CONVEX GOLDEN DISC WITH A RICH TEXTURE OF BEADS AND RADIATING LINES ACCENTUATING A RING OF BLUE ENAMEL REPRESENTING THE SURROUNDING SEA. THE DISC IS SURMOUNTED BY AN ENAMELLED CROWN SIGNIFYING THE POSITION OF THE SOVEREIGN AS HEAD OF THE ORDER. THE BLUE AND GOLD THEME IS CONTINUED IN THE RIBBON.

VARIOUS INSIGNIA ARE ILLUSTRATED IN DIFFERENT STYLES. THE ACTUAL PIECES FOR THE TWO DIVISIONS OF THE ORDER ARE IDENTICAL: TO DISTINGUISH BETWEEN THE DIVISIONS, THE RIBBON FOR THE MILITARY DIVISION HAS A NARROW GOLD BAND ON EACH EDGE. THE STYLE OF MOUNTING MAY VARY ACCORDING TO THE WISHES OF THE RECIPIENTS.

- The Order recognizes Australian citizens and other persons for outstanding achievement and contributions or meritorious service to Australia or humanity.

- Post nominals : AC, AO, AM, OAM



- The Chancellor of The Order of Australia is the Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia, His Excellency General the Honourable David Hurley AC DSC (ret'd)

The Australian honours system celebrates the outstanding achievements and contributions of extraordinary Australians in a diverse range of fields and areas of endeavour.

What sort of actions, service or activities do YOU think should be recognized with an Order of Australia Award?

For this person, how would you go about collecting the information you need to complete the online nomination form including :

- A short case of why/who you are nominating
 - Examples of how they have demonstrated outstanding qualities
 - What they have done to make things better for others
 - The role(s) or area(s) in which they have excelled
 - The period of time, or dates of service (if known)
 - Evidence of other awards or recognition received by the nominee
- Names and contact details four referees.
