The Victoria League Brisbane has provided a heads-up on the release of the official emblem for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee in 2022. The Queen will become the first British monarch to celebrate 70 years of service. Early this coming September two special National focus days arise.

The first occurs on the first of the month. In 1992, 1 September (the first day of spring) was formally proclaimed as National Wattle Day. This year Australia Post will release a Wattle Wonders series depicting three wattles that do not have yellow flowers, viz. *Acacia leprosa* with red flowers, *Acacia purpureopetala* with purple flowers and *Acacia alata* var. *biglandulosa* with white flowers.



On Friday 3 September 2021 we celebrate the 120<sup>th</sup> anniversary of flying the first Australian National Flag. The following summary has been gleaned from a number of government portals.



The Australian National Flag is Australia's foremost national symbol and has become an expression of Australian identity and pride. The flag is paraded by our defence forces and displayed around the country at sporting events and by service organisations, schools, community groups and private citizens.

Australian National Flag Day, proclaimed in 1996 as a national day, celebrates the first time the flag was flown on 3 September 1901. On that day Prime Minister Edmund Barton announced the winners of a competition to design a flag for Australia. A large flag, 5.5 metres by 11 metres, was flown over the dome of the Exhibition Building in Melbourne, which was then the seat of the federal government. At that time the flag was known as the Commonwealth blue ensign; later, the flag became known as the Australian National Flag.

The Australian National Flag has three elements on a blue background: the Union Jack, the Commonwealth Star and the Southern Cross. The Union Jack acknowledges the history of British settlement. The Commonwealth or Federation star has seven points representing the unity of the six states and the territories of the Commonwealth of Australia.

As citizens of this favoured nation we ought all to celebrate with pride this special anniversary of the Australian National Flag.
