

Abstract of speech given on 14 June 2021: "The Queen's Land: Queensland"

The paper is about the 'Queen's Land' that is two words 'Queen's Land' as it was first written by Queen Victoria. Secretary of State for the Colonies, Sir Edward Bulwer Lytton amended it to one word 'Queensland'.

Over the 10 years from 1849 there would be a revolution in British colonial policy. It affected all aspects of Queensland's future, particularly its constitution and functioning as a colony. Following demands by colonists, the British Imperial parliament gave representative responsible self-government to New South Wales and Victoria in 1855. However, Queensland had to wait until 6 June 1859 for the Letters Patent and Order in Council to be signed by Queen Victoria and then on 10 December 1859 separation from New South Wales occurred.

Queensland, unlike other Australian colonies, was given under its Constitution representative and responsible self-government from its establishment. Other Australian colonies began as Crown colonies governed by a Governor appointed by the British Crown, without responsible self-government. Although with responsible government the colonies were given power over most of their internal affairs, they did not have power over foreign affairs and defence, which were reserved for the British Imperial government.

Although Queensland wanted separation, New South Wales politicians were not yet beaten and in a devious act in 1854 established a government post at Port Curtis. They wanted the new colony to be North of the 26<sup>th</sup> parallel of south latitude, which is roughly North of present-day Gympie. To give the project further impetus they named the new town Gladstone, after William Gladstone, later British Prime Minister, which they planned to be the new colony's capital.

Queensland's population in December 1859 was estimated at roughly 23,000 compared to New South Wales 327,000 and Victoria 521,000.
