Dear Members and Affiliates, A message from the Chair of the Northern Region (Tas) – Sue Shea OAM



The Northern Region members were most appreciative of the hosting of a function this week by His Worship the Mayor of Launceston, Councillor Albert van Zetten at the Town Hall to recognise the Order of Australia Association. This Civic Reception has been an annual event for some years and we are most grateful for the support of the Mayor and the City of Launceston to recognise the special contribution and achievements made by those members in our community who have been recognised with Order of Australia awards.

On Friday 19th November the Region will be hosting Her Excellency the Honourable Barbara Baker AC, The Governor of Tasmania, and Emeritus Professor Don Chalmers, AO at a cocktail function to be held at the Launceston Club. Due to Covid restrictions our numbers are limited to Northern members only. Places will be allocated in the order of the responses and payments received.

On Tuesday 21 September the OAA Tasmania Branch invited the Branch committee and a group of members to a virtual meeting with the Governor-General, His Excellency, General the Honourable David Hurley AC DSC (Retd) and Her Excellency Mrs Linda Hurley. This was an informal conversation to acknowledge the work undertaken by Branch members due to the inability of Their Excellencies to tour the State with the current Covid restrictions in place. We were delighted to hear from His Excellency of his personal efforts to promote the Order of Australia and to recognise the work of multicultural communities, of women, and of people who are currently under-represented in the eminent award system in Australia. His Excellency also advised that he was very much aware of the confusion which occurs with the Order of Australia awards coinciding with the Australian of the Year announcements on Australia Day.

In The Examiner newspaper on 21 August there was a very complimentary article to celebrate 50 years of service and contribution by Dr Frank Madill AM to the Northern Bombers Football Club. Club President Thane Brady was quoted as saying "*If Frank played football, he would be the ultimate utility.* You could play him in every position. He can sing, dance, MC, save our lives, enter politics, become hugely popular and successful, a farmer, father, husband, author, and volunteer serving multiple community organisations." Congratulations and well done Frank!

Dr Rosemary Callingham AM Director (Tas) OAA Board.

Rosemary is enjoying her role as the Tasmanian Director on the OAA Board. To enable you to find out more about Rosemary she was invited to share more about her activities.



I am a retired academic having worked at two universities in mathematics education – educating pre-service teachers about teaching mathematics. This career has taken me to some surprising places. I worked with UNICEF in North Korea, helping the Korean educators develop a new primary mathematics curriculum using evidence-based processes. I was privileged to visit the country seven times over the three-year life of that project. More recently I spent a month in Kazakhstan as a visiting scholar at a developing university,

working with teacher educators – all of whom were very young by Australian standards! I have also had extended stays in Hong Kong. I have come to realise that the challenges for educators may seem diverse in different places, but that everywhere I have been, teachers at all levels want the best outcomes for their students.

The varied encounters that I have been privileged to experience have made me realise the importance of social equity. As a result, I worked with Anglicare Tasmania as a board member for nine years, the last three as chair. The variety of needs and the extent of poverty in Tasmania is confronting at times. Those working directly in the field, regardless of which organisation they work for, go way beyond expectations to support people needing help. I have found that Tasmanians genuinely care about each other and want to support the most vulnerable members of our community, both formally through funded programs, and informally through their own neighbourhood networks.

Since being awarded my AM for services to mathematics education, teacher development and the community, I have taken on the role of the Tasmanian director on the Order of Australia national board. The amazing people I am meeting, and the wide range of interests and achievements is genuinely awe-inspiring. I am convinced that the system of Australian honours is unique, and I encourage everyone to consider nominating an unsung hero.

A life in Early Childhood Education

Like many Order of Australia recipients, Di began her life's work several decades ago. Di's commitment to young children's learning and well-being surfaced during the years she co-created innovative teaching programs with parents and children in a small country school in QLD.

Di entered the early childhood sector when the first QLD State preschools were established.

Di says: "My first forty years of professional life in QLD prepared me

for my move to Tasmania in 2009". During those years Di worked in and with QLD schools, pre-schools and kindergartens, centre-based early education and care, family day care, outside school hours care and TAFE. She spent almost 30 years lecturing at the QLD University of Technology (QUT) where she was involved in international early learning and leadership projects and won awards for teaching. Di's passion for the importance of getting it right in children's early years grew as she established, volunteered in, and led a wide range of professional and communitybased organisations. She developed and facilitated educational, leadership and parenting programs; wrote educational materials, articles for journals, and edited a professional magazine.

As an early childhood researcher at QUT, Di published findings in peer reviewed journals and gave keynote presentations at national conferences. Di's advocacy came to the fore as an expert witness in industrial campaigns for better conditions for early years educators. She was awarded a QLD Institute of Educational Administration Fellowship for her contribution to educational leadership in that State. Finally, Di's consultancies to the QLD and South Australian governments paved the way for her current roles contributing to Tasmania's Departments of Education and Communities early years initiatives.



Since 2009 Di's continuous part-time teaching at UTas has led to her involvement in a team-teaching award and participation in a range of early childhood research projects (some linked to her almost completed PhD). Di serves on the committees of professional and community-based organisations working to enhance the lives of Tasmania's young children. She is also involved in a Teacher Registration Board pilot program to recognise teachers' educational leadership skills. Grass roots 'missions' continue to evolve. These include State-wide projects around intergenerational arts explorations. Di aims to involve EVERYONE in building children's creative skills and more. Thankfully, recent initiatives around the need for a 'Tasmanian Village to raise our children' will generate possibilities for action. If you are keen to join in just let Di know.

Di has made a tremendous contribution to early childhood education for over 40 years and her OAM award recognises her service, innovation, and commitment to create a better future for all children.


