# FELLOWSHIP LUNCHEON MEETING Thursday 27 October 2022

The guest speaker for our October honours recipients fellowship luncheon will be Mr John Ford OAM FASMA. John's topic is: "The Journey to South Australia and early Migrant Ships".

John is a renowned marine artist. His artwork displays the subtle hues and intricate detail of the watercolour style. His works are substantially based on maritime themes, however his portfolio also extends to historical buildings, steam locomotives, military subjects and animals.

With numerous exhibitions and art awards to his credit, John is one of South Australia's leading artists. John's work has been commissioned for many Australian and international, private and corporate collections. These include the Make a Wish Foundation, the SA Maritime Museum, the Royal Australian Navy, Australia Post, the SA Aviation Museum, the National Cancer Council Research Foundation, Encounter 2002 Official Event, and the ABC series 'The Navigators'. John accepts commissioned work: the chosen subject is meticulously researched and the artwork carefully executed. John also teaches art professionally, with programs catering for beginners through to advanced artists.

John received the Medal of the Order of Australia in 2021, "For service to the community of Port Adelaide".

He is a Fellow of the Australian Society of Maritime Artists. He serves as the State Vice-President of the Australian Society of Maritime Artists, Chairperson of the Port Adelaide Community Art Centre. He is a member of Friends of the SA Maritime Museum, and a member of the SA Aviation Museum. He is a Life Member and Board member of the Friends of the One and All Sail Training Association, former community representative on the Port Adelaide Renewal Steering Committee, Deputy Chair Adelaide Brighton Cement Community Liaison Group, committee member Victoria Road Air Quality Study.

John is also a tour guide for Port Adelaide Enfield Council, and was awarded a Citizen of the Year Australia Day Award from Port Adelaide Enfield Council in 2013 for his services to the Arts and the Community.

# 'JOURNEY TO SOUTH AUSTRALIA' Mr John Ford OAM FASMA

Throughout August, John had his artworks displayed in an exhibition presented by Genealogy SA as part of the South Australian Living Artists (SALA) Festival for 2022. The exhibition was formally opened by His Worship Michael Hewitson AM, Mayor of the City of Unley on Saturday 6 August. The featured image is the *City of Adelaide* – the world's oldest clipper ship, built in Sunderland, England and launched on 7 May 1864. Between 1864 and 1887, the *City of Adelaide* made 23 annual return voyages from London and Plymouth to Adelaide.

The SALA Festival is a state-wide festival of visual art. The festival was established in 1998 to promote and celebrate the many talented visual artists in South Australia. A week-long event when it first started, the festival now spans the entire month of August, involving over 600 venues and over 9,000 participating artists.

# Marjorie Olive THORNTON OAM (née Pullen, 1921-2022)

On 1 August, John Hutchinson OAM and his wife Athalie represented the Fleurieu Regional Group at the funeral of Marjorie Thornton OAM. Marjorie was aged 100 when she passed away on 15 July. She had received the Medal of the Order of Australia in the 2016 Australia Day Honours List, *"For service to the community of Port Elliot"*.

Marjorie was the daughter of a Great War veteran who lived in Birmingham, and in 1941 the family home twice suffered from attacks from German bombers, resulting in the death of the family dog.

Marjorie volunteered for the Women's Auxiliary Corps, and was employed in a highly secret role with the Government Code and Cypher School at Bletchley Park.

John relates: "She was a most remarkable woman – one who worked on deciphering German codes in WW2".

#### **Brian Gilbertson AM**

Brian Gilbertson was appointed a Member of the Order of Australia in the Queen's Birthday Honours List of 14 June 2021, "For significant service to festivals and events in South Australia, to opera, and to voice education".

Brian's more recent story starts in 1984 when he sold his legal practice and went to Vienna to study Voice and Drama at the University of Performing Arts.

From that decision grew a 20-year career as a principal tenor in Opera, Gilbert & Sullivan and Musicals, expanding into production, direction and performance around the world.

Brian became a regular performer on Bert Newton's 'Good Morning Australia', and he produced several commercial recordings.

He was a performer with the State Opera of South Australia from 1989, and Principal Artist from 1989 to 2001. He was also a Board Member of Festivals Adelaide from 1998 to 2021. Brian was the first person to sing both the Australian and Sri Lankan national anthems – at the 1996 Australia Day Test Cricket match in Adelaide. This became a tradition at Australia Day international sporting events.

He was then invited to sing anthems at international sporting events in several languages.

In 1999, Brian was an Arts Ambassador for the Sydney 2000 Olympic Games, giving concerts and voice masterclasses across nine countries.

On his return he set up a singing tips website, sharing his knowledge with thousands globally across the years.

He created the inaugural Bundaleer Forest Concert Weekend and Opera in the Wetlands, introducing regional South Australia to the world of opera in a natural setting.

He has been Manager of the Inaugural Word Adelaide Festival, a performer in the Adelaide Fringe Festival, and a performer at the Victorian Centre for Performing Arts.

In 2002, Brian became the Event Manager and Creative Director of the Adelaide Christmas Pageant.


On Saturday 12 November Brian will be delivering his twentieth pageant – when it returns to the streets of Adelaide. During the COVID Pandemic he twice directed the delivery of the Pageant as an Arena Spectacular at the Adelaide Oval.

For his services to the arts and the Adelaide Christmas Pageant, in 2010 Brian was named Citizen of the Year by the Lord Mayor of the City of Adelaide. In 2016, he was awarded a star on the Festival Theatre Walk of Fame. And then in 2021 he was appointed a Member of the Order of Australia.

Brian has delivered many keynote addresses to diverse audiences, with a particular reference to embracing change and meeting both expected and unexpected challenges. In recent times those challenges have been the most significant in his career. Turning a street parade into an arena spectacular in less than three months required the buy in of several thousand volunteers and professionals, a challenge that some said was impossible.

At our Christmas Morning Tea, Brian will tell us something about his transition from law to opera to pageant director, and embracing the challenge of change including preparation for the parades and some of the highlights of the 2022 Christmas Pageant.





Knight, Companion or Officer. The Order of Australia is the only order of chivalry within the Australian system of honours and awards. It was established by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, Queen of Australia, on the advice of the Australian Prime Minister, by Letters Patent dated 14 February 1975.<sup>1</sup> At the time of its creation, the order comprised just three levels – Companion (AC), Officer (AO) and Member (AM). Letters Patent dated 24 May 1976 established the Medal of the Order (OAM) and also the grade of Knight/Dame (AK/ AD), although this grade has been available for conferral only in 1976-83 and 2014-15.

The insignia ordinance describes the ribbons of the order as being of Royal blue silk moiré in three sizes – 38mm, 32mm and 16mm in width.<sup>2</sup> The widest ribbon has a central band 12mm wide, of scattered golden mimosa blossoms of various sizes; the other widths have the same pattern in proportion. Each of these golden discs represents a single flower of mimosa (Australian 'golden wattle'), which is the emblem of the Order.<sup>3</sup>

In the grades of Knight, Companion and Officer, the full-size insignia is worn as a neck decoration. A Dame of the Order may also wear her insignia as a neck decoration if preferred.

In uniform, each of these grades is always worn as a neck decoration.<sup>4</sup> The insignia of a Knight, Companion and Officer is presented with a fullsize 38mm neck ribbon, with fastening clasps at either end. This ribbon is only ever used for the purposes of the investiture, and should not be used again after that. A miniature-size ribbon, 16mm in width, is used to wear the neck badge insignia on all future occasions.

The Order of Australia is now in its fifth decade of existence and is well-established within the Australian Honours System. Yet many people, recipients included, are not fully aware of some of the more interesting aspects of the insignia and ribbon.

# Coronation Medals

# A Brief History, Part 2

This year we marked the 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the day in 1952 when Princess Elizabeth, as heir presumptive, acceded to the throne as Queen Elizabeth II, the fourth monarch of the House of Windsor.

Queen Elizabeth became Head of the Commonwealth and Queen Regnant of seven independent Commonwealth countries (the UK, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, Pakistan and Ceylon).

And in June next year we will mark the 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II, an event which was celebrated throughout the Commonwealth by the awarding of a Coronation Medal.

Medals have long been awarded by a sovereign as a personal souvenir at the time of their coronation or on the jubilee of their accession to the throne.

This tradition dates from the coronation of King Edward VI in 1547, when the first official medals to commemorate the coronation of a British sovereign were distributed. King William IV released such medals for his coronation in 1831, as also did Queen Victoria in 1838. These early medals (also referred to as medallions, medallets or commemorative coins) were not intended for wear.

## **Queen Victoria Coronation Medal (1838)**

Upon the death of her uncle King William IV at Windsor Castle on 20 June 1837, Princess Victoria of Kent (Alexandrina Victoria) acceded to the throne as sovereign of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, aged 18, adopting the regnal name 'Victoria'.

After an appropriate period of mourning, Queen Victoria's coronation ceremony was conducted at Westminster Abbey on 28 June 1838.

This followed a public procession through the streets from Buckingham Palace, to which the Queen returned later as part of a second procession. This procession by coach to and from the Abbey has been repeated in all subsequent coronations.

Queen Victoria held the title, "Victoria, by the Grace of God, Queen of the British, Defender of the Faith".


In 1876, Parliament voted Queen Victoria the title of "Empress of India" to signify her rule over British India as its imperial head of state. This took effect on 1 May 1876, under the *Royal Titles Act 1876*.

The first Delhi Durbar (which served as an imperial coronation) was held in her honour eight months later on 1 January 1877.

Queen Victoria was the last British monarch of the House of Hanover.
