## VALE Lady Joan NEAL AM DStJ (1931-2023)

Lady Joan Neal passed away at home in her sleep on 28 February 2023, aged 92.

Thelma Joan Bowden was born on 13 February 1931. In 1949, she became engaged to Eric Neal from London, who had migrated with his family to Adelaide in February 1927. They were married at St Peter's Church in Glenelg in 1950. After Sir Eric Neal became the 32nd Governor of South Australia and Deputy Prior of the Order of St John in South Australia in 1996, he was admitted to the Order of St John as a Knight of Grace (KStJ) – at the same time, Lady Joan Neal was admitted to the Order as a Dame of Grace (DStJ).

Lady Joan was appointed a Member of the Order of Australia in the 2002 Queen's Birthday Honours List, "For service to the community, in particular as a supporter of the work of the Sydney City Mission and through a broad range of social welfare, service and youth groups in South Australia".

For the Duke of Edinburgh's Award International Association, Lady Joan and Sir Eric were Australian World Fellows and Australian Award Ambassadors. They are noted as having been key advocates and generous donors for the Duke of Edinburgh's International Award.

The funeral service was held on Wednesday 8 March in the family's church, St Peter's Anglican Church in Glenelg.

### LIEUTENANT-COLONEL DAVID BROOK OAM (ret'd)


David Brook received the Medal of the Order of Australia in the 2016 Queen's Birthday Honours List, "For services to Military History and the Recreational Boating Industry". David is a retired Regular Army artillery officer. He was born in Adelaide and was educated at Prince Alfred College, and was called up under the National Service Training Scheme in January 1957. He was commissioned in 1965 and transferred to the Australian Regular Army, allotted to the Royal Australian Artillery. He saw active service with the 12<sup>th</sup> Field Regiment, RAA in South Vietnam from 4 March 1968 to 11 March 1969.

David was Battery Captain of 102 Field Battery during the Tet Offensive attacks on Fire Support Base 'Coral', commanding the gun position. On his return to Australia, he commanded the 121<sup>st</sup> Light Anti-Aircraft Battery, RAA in Darwin.

After attending training courses in England, he commanded the Proof & Experimental Establishment at Port Wakefield. He held staff appointments in Melbourne, and returned to Adelaide in 1982 commanding the 4<sup>th</sup> Army Quality Assurance Unit. He retired from the army with the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel, taking up the position of Registrar of the Surveyors Board of South Australia until retiring from the workforce in 2001.

David has been a member of the Naval, Military and Air Force Club since 1966. From 1989 to 1996 he was Colonel Commandant of the Royal Australian Artillery in South Australia and the Northern Territory.

Lieutenant-Colonel Brook is a member of the Royal Australian Artillery Regimental Committee's History Sub-committee, and has written and lectured on military history topics. He compiled the biographical entry on Brigadier Sir Thomas Eastick for the *Australian Dictionary of Biography*, and completed four books on the technical history of the Amiens Gun at the Australian War Memorial. He also produced a Jubilee 150 history of artillery in South Australia, a cruising guide for the lower Murray, the Lakes and the Coorong, and the history of the Naval, Military and Air Force Club of South Australia.

Dean has served as Chairman of the Loxton Community Men's Shed (since 2013), Co-Zone Leader of Neighbourhood Watch in Loxton and as a Justice of the Peace, and as an office bearer in numerous community and sporting groups. Dean was a Councillor for the District Council of Loxton Waikerie (1997-00) and a Councillor for Browns Well Council (1990-97). In 2016, he was announced as the Australia Day Citizen of the Year for the District Council of Loxton Waikerie.

Dean is also a long-serving member of the Country Fire Service (Browns Well Brigade and Chaffey Operations Brigade). He has received the National Medal for 15 years' long service with the CFS (2014), and the 30 Year Service Medal (2019).

## FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM 2023

#### **DON CLARK OAM**

For the honours recipients fellowship luncheon on <u>Thursday 29 June</u>, the speaker will be Branch Committee member Don Clarke OAM on the topic: "My involvement with livestock in the Middle East".

Don was awarded the OAM in the 2019 Australia Day Honours List, "For service to the livestock industry".

Don was born in Strathalbyn Hospital in 1938, the second child of Vera and Roy Clark.

Vera was the organist for the local Methodist Church, and Roy was a bass drummer with the Strathalbyn Town Band. Among Don's earliest memories are listening to the band in the Strathalbyn Botanical Gardens.

Don spent his young years fishing, shooting, rabbiting, yabbying and mushrooming with friends. Later he was a member of the Strathalbyn High School football team and cricket team (taking 8 for 50 as a bowler at the age of 16, and achieving his first century as an 18 year old batsman).

In the late 1950s, Don was an office boy and merchandise officer with Farmers Union in Strathalbyn, and with Southern Farmers in Franklin Street.

He transferred to Kadina as Livestock Manager with Southern Farmers; while there he was the 1963-64 best all-rounder in the Kadina Cricket Club, A Grade.

From Kadina, Don became Head Auctioneer and Store Stock Officer for half the state for 15 years, then becoming Livestock Manager.

After five years he retired, to take on a position as General Manager of Farrer's Rural – a Lebanese export company serving mainly Iran in live sheep and cattle.

Don had responsibility live export in SA for three years, and then Victoria for three years, and then nationally working closely with the Australian Livestock Exporters Association. Don became Chairman of that group, which involved government as well as most industry bodies.

He became the longest serving Chairman since the Australian Livestock Exporters Association was formed.

For his many years as a leader and representative for Australia's livestock export industry, Don was inducted into the Livestock Export Industry's Hall of Fame.

After a minor stroke in 1994, he resigned to commence work with the Kuwait Livestock Transport and Trading Company. As Quality Control Officer, Don oversaw and prepared some 18,000 sheep per day for export to the Middle East, developing strategies to substantially reduce mortality within 3 years.

Don said, "This along with alterations to shipboard activity reduced the industry mortality to 1% largely thanks to the Kuwait government for their assistance".

It was this achievement that had considerable influence in Don receiving the OAM.

# Coronation Medals

A Brief History, Part 9


In May this year, we look forward to the Coronation of King Charles III, the fifth monarch of the House of Windsor and King of Australia.

On 8 September 2022, Prince Charles acceded to the throne with the title, "by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and of his other Realms and Territories, King, Head of the Commonwealth, Defender of the Faith".

Medals have long been awarded by a sovereign as a personal souvenir at the time of their coronation or on the jubilee of their accession to the throne.

This tradition dates from the coronation of King Edward VI in 1547, when the first official medals to commemorate the coronation of a British sovereign were distributed. King William IV released such medals for his coronation in 1831, as also did Queen Victoria in 1838.

These early medals (also referred to as medallions, medallets or commemorative coins) were simple souvenirs, and were not intended for wear.



This is the official souvenir program for the Coronation of King George VI and Queen Elizabeth on 12 May 1937.

### **King George VI Coronation Medallion (1937)**

On 11 December 1936 Prince Albert, Duke of York, the second son of King George V, acceded to the throne as King George VI, the third monarch of the House of Windsor.

George VI was King of the United Kingdom and the Dominions of the British Commonwealth, and at the time of his coronation was Emperor of India.

Following the granting of independence to India and Pakistan in 1947, on 22 June 1948 George VI relinquished the title of 'Emperor of India' – under the *Indian Independence Act 1947* George VI became king of the new dominions of India and Pakistan. At that time, he adopted the new title of 'Head of the Commonwealth'.

In addition to the official Coronation Medal, an official commemorative medallion was released to mark the coronation of King George VI and Queen Elizabeth at Westminster Abbey on 12 May 1937.

It was struck by the Royal Mint in two sizes (57 mm and 32 mm), in .925 silver and in bronze. The obverse bears the crowned effigy of King George VI in his robes of state, facing left.



This official commemorative medallion was released by the Royal Mint – 32 mm in diameter and struck in .925 sterling silver. This medallion was designed by the noted English artist, sculptor and designer Percy Metcalfe CVO (1895-1970) and bears the initials 'PM' at the base of the King's left shoulder.

# HIS MAJESTY KING CHARLES III

by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and of his other Realms and Territories, King, Head of the Commonwealth, Defender of the Faith

As heir apparent, the Prince of Wales (Charles Philip Arthur George) acceded to the throne of the United Kingdom and fourteen other Commonwealth realms upon the death of Queen Elizabeth II, on the afternoon of 8 September 2022, becoming the fifth monarch of the House of Windsor.

Charles III was formally proclaimed monarch at an Accession Council convened at St James's Palace in London on Saturday 10 September.



The Accession Proclamation also formally announced the new monarch's regnal name. The text of the proclamation was published as Supplement No 1 to *The London Gazette*, no 63812 of 12 September.

The proclamation in Australia took place in front of Parliament House, Canberra on Sunday 11 September and was read out by the Governor-General after being approved by the Australian Executive Council.

Similar proclamations took place in all the states of Australia, reflecting each state's separate relationship to the Crown.

The formal title of Charles III in Australia is: "His Majesty Charles the Third, by the Grace of God, King of Australia and His other Realms and Territories, Head of the Commonwealth".

As a reigning monarch, King Charles does not usually use a family name, but when one is needed it is Mountbatten-Windsor.

King Charles has some special connections to Australia, which include the following:

- In the Australian Antarctic Territory, 'Prince Charles Mountains' were named in 1956 in his honour.
- In 1966, Prince Charles was educated for six months (two terms) at the Timbertop campus of Geelong Grammar School.
- Prince Charles set up the Prince's Charities Australia, based in Melbourne, to provide a coordinating presence for Prince Charles's Australian and international charitable endeavours.
- Apart from his time at Timbertop, Prince Charles has visited Australia in 1967 (representing the Queen at the memorial service for Prime Minister Harold Holt), 1970, 1974, 1977 (as patron of the Queen's Australian Silver Jubilee Appeal), 1978 (attended the funeral of Sir Robert Menzies), 1979, 1981, 1983, 1985, 1988 (for Australia's Bicentenary celebrations), 1994, 2005, 2015 (official tour of Australia) and 2018.
- In 1977, Prince Charles was appointed Colonel-in-Chief of the Royal Australian Armoured Corps.
- On 14 March 1981, through a special amendment to the Constitution of the Order of Australia, the then Prince of Wales was appointed a Knight of the Order of Australia (AK).
- In 2015, Prince Charles visited Turkey to attend commemorations marking the centenary of the Gallipoli landings and attended, among several other activities, the Dawn Service at Anzac Cove and the Australian service of thanksgiving at Lone Pine.
- In 2018, Prince Charles attended an Anzac Day service at the Australian National Memorial in Villers-Bretonneux in France.
- On 8 September 2022, Charles III became Sovereign of the Order of Australia.
