## FROM HER EXCELLENCY THE HONOURABLE SAM MOSTYN AC

GOVERNOR-GENERAL OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF AUSTRALIA



On Australia Day, I was delighted to announce the 949 exceptional Australians who were recognised in the Australia Day 2026 Honours List. From the youngest recipient, at 32 years of age, to our two oldest recipients, who are just about to turn 100, this list is a celebration of the many Australians who inspire the best in all of us.

The list also represents an increase of more than 200 awards since last year, resulting from a growing number of nominations. The room stood as one to recognise his extraordinary bravery during the Bondi Beach terrorist attack. He is regarded as the light of courage and compassion in a time of great tragedy.

During the event, the audience was delighted and uplifted by Mayor Bilal El-Hayek's encouragement and optimism when he shared his migrant story, saying,

"If a kid like me can come to this country at 12 with no English, and become mayor of this great city, there's no limit to what you can achieve."

I see the same energy and optimism in the remarkable Australians recognised in the Australia Day Honours list. Their diversity of interest and expertise represents Australians who embody service, community, kindness, curiosity, tenacity, accomplishment and care. And, like all lists before, the 2026 Honours list shows that great Australians come from all over our magnificent country, and from all walks of life.

## INTRODUCING THE HONOURABLE HIEU VAN LE AC



The Honourable Hieu Van Le AC was born in central Vietnam, where he attended school before studying Economics and Management at the Da Lat University in the Highlands. Mr Le and his wife, Lan, arrived in Darwin in 1977 as two boat people refugees from Vietnam. They settled in Adelaide.

Mr Le returned to study at the University of Adelaide, where he earned a degree in Economics and Accounting in 1989. In 2001, Mr Le's further study earned him a Master of Business

Administration from the same university. Mr Le gained Certified Practising Accountant accreditation, and from 1991 worked at the Australian Securities and Investments Commission (ASIC). He retired from ASIC in March 2009. During this time, Mr Le also served on many community boards and committees, in particular those relating to cultural and linguistic diversity, the arts and education.

In 1995, Mr Le was appointed a member of the South Australian Multicultural and Ethnic Affairs Commission (SAMEAC) and was appointed Deputy Chairman in 2004. When Mr Le became Chair of SAMEAC in 2007, he was the first person of Asian background to be Chair of this organisation in South Australia.

In August 2007, Mr Le was sworn in as the Lieutenant Governor of South Australia. Over the next seven years in this role, Mr Le served as Patron or honorary member of more than 30 community-based, cultural, charitable and veterans' organisations.

On 1 September 2014, Mr Le was sworn in as the 35th Governor of South Australia. He concluded his term on 31 August 2021. During seven years in this role, Mr Le served as Patron of more than 230 organisations. It is understood that Mr Le is the first Vietnam-born person who has ever been appointed to a Vice-Regal position in the world.

Mr Le was awarded the Australia Day Medal in 1996 for outstanding service to ASIC, and in 2001 he was awarded the Centenary of Federation Medal for service to the advancement of multiculturalism.

In 2010, Mr Le was appointed an Officer of the Order of Australia (AO) for outstanding service to community, social inclusion and international engagements. In June 2016, he was appointed a Companion of the Order of Australia (AC) for outstanding service to the community and to the State of South Australia. Mr Le was made an Honorary Life Member of the Order of Australia Association in 2021 and on 1 June 2026 will become the Association's new President.

In December 2021, the Italian Government awarded Mr Le the title Cavaliere (Knight) of the Order of Merit of the Italian Republic for his outstanding service and support to culturally and linguistically diverse communities in South Australia and in particular the Italian community. He was also awarded an Honorary Doctorate from Adelaide University in 2008, Flinders University in 2011 and the University of South Australia in 2023.

Currently, Mr Le is Chair of the South Australian Health and Medical Research Institute and the Australian National Maritime Museum Council. He is also the Patron, Life Member, Honorary Member, Director and Ambassador for more than 20 community-based, not-for-profit organisations.

## OUR ORGANISATION – THE ORDER OF AUSTRALIA ASSOCIATION

The Order of Australia Association (OAA) is a national, incorporated not-for-profit organisation guided by the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission (ACNC).

Our structure ensures that members across all states, territories and regions have a voice in how the Association operates.

### How we're organised:

- National President – provides overall leadership, advice to the Board, and represents the Association in Vice-Regal matters.
- National Board – includes five Executive Directors plus a Director from each State and Territory Branch. The Board sets the strategic direction and policies of the Association.

- Executive Committee – made up of the five Executive Directors (National Chair, Deputy Chair, Treasurer, Membership Director, and Secretary). They are responsible for putting Board policy into action.
- Board Committees – specialist committees (including Audit & Risk, Strategy, Marketing, Investment, Constitution, and Nomination) that develop policies and make recommendations to the Board.
- Branch Chairs and Committees – manage Association activities within each State or Territory, ensuring national policies are implemented locally. Members of each Branch elect their Branch leaders.

- Regional Groups – formed within Branches to bring members together in local communities, hosting events and fostering fellowship.

### How decisions are made:

All activities follow the National Constitution, Bylaws and Policies, which set out how the Association is governed and how members participate in decision-making.

## WHEN IT MATTERS MOST

WILLIAM LYE OAM KC, DEPUTY CHAIR OF THE ASSOCIATION



This past year has tested us: events that shook our sense of safety; social media storms that turned neighbours into strangers; the kind of tension that makes people withdraw rather than reach out.

The Order of Australia exists for moments like these.

Not because we have answers to everything that divides us. Of course we do not. But when the ground feels unsteady, Australians need to see people who still believe in each other – people who refuse to let fear curdle into suspicion or disagreement harden into division.

Our Constitution sets out the purpose of the Honours system and, by extension, our role as an Association: to recognise and encourage outstanding service and Australian citizenship - not as a closed chapter in someone's past, but as a living commitment, expressed in how we act when it is needed most.

In this term of office, the Governor-General has drawn national attention to the importance of care, kindness and respect in Australian life. She has reminded us that these are not sentimental extras, but part of a shared project to hold the country together even when debate is sharp and disagreement is real.

The Association's work makes those values concrete. We encourage nominations from every corner of Australian life, not just the usual suspects. We support young people building their careers through scholarships and mentoring. We maintain standards around discrimination, harassment and ethical conduct, because values do not mean much if they are only decorative.

The people who wear the pin come from everywhere. They have built businesses, saved lives, taught kids, fed communities, made art, defended rights. What they share is not ideology; it is a demonstrated willingness to do the work of caring for others, their communities and the institutions that serve them.

We can see what happens when institutions fail to keep pace with the Australia they serve. The Asian Australian Lawyers Association recently reported that, while 17% of Australians report Asian ancestry, only 2.9% of the judiciary are Asian Australian. More judges are named Michael than there are Asian Australian judges in total. Even where progress has been made, partnerships in major law firms have risen from 3% to just 8% Asian Australian representation over the past decade.<sup>1</sup>

We are still a long way from reflecting the country we live in. The Order of Australia cannot afford complacency on this front. Every member who knows someone doing quiet, remarkable work in their community, someone whose background or story might not fit the traditional profile, should make a nomination. That is how we stay relevant.

In an age when so many platforms reward outrage and entrench division, that willingness matters more than ever. The Order of Australia has standing in this country. It is real standing, conferred by the Crown and earned through decades of contributions that have actually improved lives. That standing is not about status; it is a trust that ought to be exercised.

The task ahead is clear. Keep nominating people who reflect modern Australia in all its depth and diversity. Keep telling fellow Australians that anyone can nominate anyone. It is not a closed shop. Keep supporting the next generation before they are fully established. Keep modelling the behaviour we want to see, including the capacity to disagree without forfeiting respect or belonging.

Honours are not an end point. They are an invitation to speak and act with greater responsibility, because more people are listening.

Australia is watching. Let us give them something worth paying attention to.

## “ WHY NO MEDAL FOR CYCLONE TRACY? ”

Fifty-one years after the most severe domestic disaster to impact Australia, many remain puzzled as to why the armed forces members who saved Darwin after Cyclone Tracy were not rewarded with a medal. For that matter, nor were the police members, those in the other Emergency Services who stayed on in Darwin, and those involved in all aspects of saving a capital city from ruin.

Decades after the event, the National Emergency Medal, established in 2011, has been rightly given to ADF members, and indeed many civilians who worked through cyclones, bushfires, and floods, including going back to 2009. But those who gave their all after the cyclone that killed 71 have no national recognition, only private pride. Yet this was the biggest operation the armed forces of the country ever mounted outside warfare, not only in numbers of personnel – around 8,000 – who worked in the northern capital, but in time too: deployments were in months, and the hours put in were often 12 or more per day, especially in the early weeks; and the conditions endured in a tropical monsoon season were often appalling.

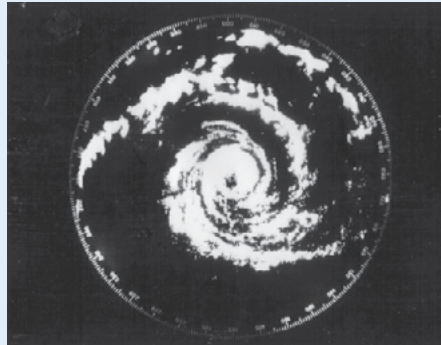
The cyclone that neared Darwin in the week before Christmas 1974 was small but gathering intensity as it approached. The diameter of its gale force winds was only about 100 km, in contrast to some north Pacific typhoons, which have had diameters of 1,500 kilometres.

The capital of the Northern Territory was a big sprawling town then, centred around its huge airport, with Australia's longest runway. In January 1974 the Darwin population had been counted as 46,656. Darwin was no stranger to destruction: it had been heavily damaged in cyclones in

1897 and 1937, and bombed by Japanese forces 77 times in World War II.

The cyclone had been named on 21 December, but there was little notice of it taken as the local residents busied themselves with Christmas preparations. The first warning that Darwin itself was threatened came at 12.30 pm on 24 December, approximately 12 hours before the onset of destructive winds.

By the early evening it was apparent the cyclone would impact Darwin, although whether it would pass directly over the built-up area was not that clear. It did, with a recorded surface wind speed of 217 km/h. The eye of the storm crossed in the early hours of Christmas Day, and it was not until mid-morning that the winds died down. By the time the residents emerged from their places of shelter it was apparent massive damage had been done.

In fact, comparisons to the atomic blasts of Hiroshima and Nagasaki in WWII were used frequently in the days ahead. The destruction was enormous. Between 50 and 60 per cent of houses were damaged beyond repair and in some of the northern suburbs the destruction was nearly 100 per cent. It left more than 25,000 out of the 47,000 inhabitants of the city homeless and required the immediate evacuation of more than 30,000 people.

Between 26 and 31 December, a total of 35,362 people were evacuated from Darwin. Of those, 25,628 were evacuated by air, the remainder by road.

Sixteen people died at sea where, according to the harbourmaster's report:

“At least 29 vessels were sunk or wrecked”. These included several of the large prawn trawlers that were based in the port, and a passenger ferry, the Darwin Princess. The biggest vessel to be sunk was the 120 foot three-masted steel schooner Booya, missing with five people on board. The Navy lost a patrol boat, HMAS Arrow, with the loss of two lives. In a double blow, the senior Navy officer present, Eric Johnston, noted a special tragedy:

*To add to the Navy's losses, four dependents, two wives and two children were also killed in their married quarters while their husbands were at their place of duty, and thus the Navy in Darwin with some 1.5 per cent of the population suffered 12 per cent of the total fatal casualties and indeed was the only service to so suffer.*

The Royal Australian Air Force immediately started bringing in essential supplies. Hercules aircraft flew in 7,000 blankets, 6,000 lbs of milk and 2,000 lbs of Red Cross medical supplies. While the run of supplies north was enormous, the evacuations were equally as large. On Boxing Day, the RAAF flew out 680 people, and the following day 1,218 in 22 sorties. The flights continued for many days, but meanwhile more RAAF members were flying in. Around 3,000 Air Force members were posted to Darwin for a three-month period.

A number of Navy vessels were quickly deployed from southern ports to Darwin. Sailors and officers were recalled from Christmas leave; ships were made hurriedly but thoroughly ready for sea, and soon a steady stream of warships was deploying north. At 20.00 on Christmas Day Clearance Diving Team One was recalled from leave, with a special role envisaged of saving sinking vessels from foundering, and searching for trapped seamen or bodies. By 10.00 the next day they were flying to the stricken northern capital. The destroyer Brisbane was the first to enter Darwin harbour. Thirteen ships, 11 naval aircraft and some 3,000 personnel were eventually involved.

The Director General of the National Disasters Organisation, Major General AB Stretton DSO, arrived in Darwin on 26 December with his staff officers to establish an Emergency Services Organisation Committee. Captain EE Johnston, the Naval Officer Commanding the North Australia Area, was appointed to the committee as Port Controller, with responsibility for controlling the port and its approaches, and for drafting an Emergency Plan in the event of a further cyclone.

As preparations were made for the arrival of the naval task group, Captain Johnston relocated the naval headquarters to his residence, Admiralty House. It was agreed that the RAN relief force would be allocated responsibility for clearing and restoring 4,740 houses in the northern suburbs of Nightcliff, Rapid Creek and Casuarina. HS 748 aircraft continued to ferry personnel and stores north to Darwin and on the return trip taking evacuees south. Evacuees were accommodated in naval shore bases HMAS Kuttabul, HMAS Penguin and HMAS Watson in Sydney; and HMAS Moreton in Brisbane.

Meanwhile Clearance Diving Team 1 was surveying damage to the patrol boats and civilian craft, searching for missing vessels, clearing Stokes and Fort Hill Wharves, and assessing how to extract the wreck of the Arrow.

The raw statistics amply illustrate the magnitude of the relief work undertaken by the RAN. Between 1 and 30 January, naval personnel spent 17,979 man days ashore, with up to 1,200 ashore at the peak of the operation. Working parties cleared some 1,593 housing blocks and cleaned up schools, government and commercial buildings and recreational facilities. They installed generators, rewired houses, repaired electrical and air-conditioning systems, re-roofed or weatherproofed buildings, and maintained and repaired vehicles. Some parties worked to save rare plants in the Botanical Gardens. Hygiene parties disposed of spoiled foodstuffs from houses, supermarkets and warehouses. Female personnel from Coonawarra supported civil relief organisations and manned communication centres. One enterprising sailor from Hobart filled in as a relief disc jockey for the local commercial radio station – essential not only for communication but for lifting morale in a shattered city. The Wessex helicopters transported 7,832 passengers, 110,912kg of freight and made 2,505 landings. The Navy's HS748 aircraft completed 14 return flights to Darwin and carried 485 passengers and 22,680kg of freight.

All the relief work was carried out in the Wet Season of the Top End of Australia. This lasts from around September to April each year, and sees daily humidity generally above 90 percent with temperatures over 30 degrees Celsius. Frequent and intense rain makes conditions even worse. Air-conditioning, used extensively now, was in its infancy in Darwin in 1974, and in any case there was massive power failure following the cyclone, often meaning buildings lacked even fans for some time.

The situation required creative thinking from all parts of the Armed Forces. Group Captain David Hitchins, the Commanding Officer of the RAAF base, described taking the initiative with spraying Darwin from the air to prevent disease:

*...the hygiene problem was extensive. Anyway, Sergeant Cowan went around and had a look and he came back and told me that if we didn't do something fairly soon to prevent the menace of breeding flies and so on, we were going to be living in the middle of a very nasty situation....*

*[With] a little bit of sculling around, we found three old gentlemen, mostly old fellows about my age, who were agricultural pilots...We gave those blokes carte blanche to spray Darwin, including the RAAF Base. We said we'd provide them with a place to live, free beer, and they could control their own air operations.*

*Without pay, the three then "spent the next three or four days beating up and down the main streets of Darwin at about 100 feet".*

The pilots eventually did get paid, Hitchins said.

Some of the ways in which the Navy teams were able to help were different indeed. An officer later to become Chief of the Navy, Rear Admiral Shackleton, recalls being asked by a distraught woman to help find her husband's pay envelope, which had been on the kitchen table when the cyclone struck. Such envelopes contained cash, as that was how people were usually paid then. The only problem with helping the woman search was that her house had been largely destroyed. The Navy

members swapped wry glances, but some of them volunteered, and the pay envelope was found.

Working parties were typically composed of 10 or 15 officers and sailors, depending upon the nature of the task. Johnston noted:

*Despite this, the cheerfulness and the work of the sailors and officers was a subject of much favourable comment. I mention officers for, apart from those controlling personnel, the officers were best employed in manual labour and a photo of the captain of Melbourne, Commodore Guy Griffiths, stripped to the waist and carrying a large baulk of timber, made the front pages in southern newspapers.*

At the end of January the Navy concluded operations and handed over to the Army. A Force Field Group of 650 personnel had been assembled and moved to Darwin, with a primary responsibility of individual home clearance, the repair of services, safety checks, and the re-roofing of homes.

Later Governor-General Peter Cosgrove, then a captain, was one of the soldiers deployed. He later recalled: "I was up here in Darwin soon after Cyclone Tracy, when Santa didn't make it into Darwin. Santa didn't but the Australian Defence Force did, we were here for weeks and weeks."

Questions as to why there was no decoration awarded for this service were soon forthcoming. But no action was taken, and therefore no group decoration made. There have been suggestions made to rectify this situation, but they have either met with silence or refusal for various reasons. In many ways the lack of action can be summarised as follows:

1. *There is an expectation in the Armed Forces that unusual or arduous duty is part of the job.* Indeed, rather than be paid an extra hourly rate or similar for work performed after normal 9-5 or weekday hours, ADF personnel are paid what was known then and is now as a "Service Allowance". In 2023 that was \$13,448 per year. More money is paid to naval personnel who are at sea, and if deployed to a combat zone ADF members received additional pay, with income tax suspended for their time. So in many ways it is an expectation that Service life demands more. Then again, deployment to relief operations for Cyclone Tracy demanded much more: highly unpleasant work in extremely arduous conditions for week after week.
2. *There was no such honour as the National Emergency Medal at the time.* However, there is nothing to stop the federal government making

the decoration retrospective. Indeed, this has already been done: the Medal was established in 2011 but recognises operations from 2009.

3. *Many people argue that making such a medal retrospective would result in a flood of applications for it to be applied to other situations.* To which must be said, what of it? Why not reward people for service beyond the norm? It can only serve to make such the Forces and the Emergency Services more attractive to both those who served then, and those who serve now. In fact anyone who gave service to bring Darwin back from disaster could be so rewarded.
4. *There would be difficulty finding the names of the personnel who served in Tracy operations.* This is not a realistic argument. Considerable records exist from the time, and aircraft manifests and ship schemes of complement and the like are plentiful, as are pay records. Each branch of the ADF also

contains personnel in historical sections who might well be tasked to find such records.

In conclusion, the award of the National Emergency Medal would seem both possible and have much to recommend it for Armed Forces personnel involved in Cyclone Tracy.

## FEATURED MEMBER

### VALE DR TED EGAN

The death of **Dr Ted Egan AO** in December 2025 is noted with deep sadness and respect. Dr Egan was not only Administrator of the Northern Territory from 2003 to 2007, but an icon in our community, and was accorded the status of Living National Treasure by the National Trust of Australia, an award that has always been limited to just 100 people at any one time.

Ted first came to the Northern Territory in 1949 at the age of 17. Between 1949 and 1973, he worked with the Native Affairs Branch in the outback as a Patrol Officer, a Superintendent on an Aboriginal Reserve, a schoolteacher and a school principal. He spent much time working in various Indigenous communities throughout the Territory, during which he gained valuable insight into the culture and challenges faced by Indigenous people in the NT.

Ted became active in the sporting realm and in 1952 was co-founder of one of the NT's most successful football clubs: Saint Mary's. The club welcomed and trained many Indigenous footballers, especially from the Tiwi Islands, and Ted's legacy remains strong.

Ted was a renowned raconteur and singer and, in fact, learned at least two Indigenous languages through song. He became famous around the Territory for his performances, singing and drumming on an empty beer carton. His original songs included *Sayonara Nakamura*, *The Drover's Boy*, *Drinkers of the Territory*, *The Bangtail Muster*, *Poor Fellow My Country* and *Gurrindji Blues*, all included in his 25 Albums of Songs.

Ted was also a television presenter and author of several books. His most recent book *Justice All Their Own* has been very well received in legal circles. Ted has been described as one of the few people to have successfully bridged the gap between recording, writing and live performance. His books and original songs have contributed to a deeper understanding of the Northern Territory's history and culture.

During his lifetime Ted was honoured and awarded on many occasions: In 1991 he became a Member of the Order of Australia (AM) and in 2003 was elevated to Officer of the Order of Australia (AO). He was named a Living National Treasure in 2004 and in 2011 received an Honorary Doctorate (D.Lit) from Charles Darwin University.

Ted was the inaugural recipient of the Australia Folk Trust Award for being a major contributor to Australian Traditional Music. In 2023 the NT Branch of the Order of Australia Association recognised Ted with a Lifetime of Service Award, with a spoken tribute by his friend and colleague Mr. Earl James AM, which has been drawn on here.

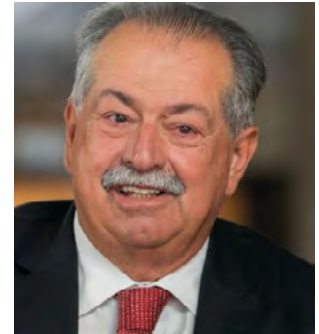

# VALE DAME MARIE BASHIR AD CVO

It is with great sadness that we acknowledge the passing of **Professor the Hon. Dame Marie Bashir AD CVO**.

Dame Marie served as the 37th Governor of New South Wales from 2001 to 2014, tirelessly supported by her husband, Sir Nicholas Shehadie AC OBE.

We all pay tribute and mourn the passing of this esteemed Australian who served the community of New South Wales in her many varied roles and also in the highest office in the State and the oldest public office in Australia as Governor. She was the first woman and also the first person of Lebanese descent to be appointed as governor of an Australian state.

Professor Bashir was made an Officer of the Order of Australia in 1988 for her services to child and adolescent health and subsequently made a Companion of the Order in 2001. She was later invested by Her Late Majesty The Queen, with the insignia of a Commander of the Royal Victorian Order (CVO) in 2006. She was

named Dame (AD) in the General Division of the Order of Australia in the 2014 Queen's Birthday Honours.

NSW Branch Chair John Gullotta AM knew her in her role as a fellow doctor, the 17th Chancellor of the University of Sydney and Governor of NSW. He said that Dame Marie was a kind, humble, caring, compassionate and very down-to-earth lady and that he felt so very fortunate to have known her.

Dame Marie exemplified the essence and spirit of being a true Australian and she will be truly missed! She was a much-loved and long-standing member of our community who made a remarkable contribution to Australian public life and mental health leadership.

On behalf of the NSW Branch Committee and The Order of Australia Association, we convey the deepest and heartfelt condolences to Dame Marie's three children, six grandchildren and all her extended family.

# BETTY LAVERTY OAM

Betty Laverty OAM received her award in 2022, having started her life of volunteering at the age of 19 when she became secretary of the Northern Branch of the Youth Hostels Association, a worldwide organisation. With others she did many workshops improving the

accommodation of these hostels in and around northern Tasmania.

Betty became involved in the Launceston Caledonian Society in the early 1960s and was Secretary for 12 years, having served on the committee from the early 70s. She also ran the pre-ball socials from 1973 to the late 90s, usually three each year before the Caledonian Ball that was held annually in Launceston.

Betty joined the Scottish Country Dancing in 1958 and began assisting with the teaching and took over the class in 1982. She was Treasurer for the class for about 25 years, also becoming Secretary of the class. Betty was awarded a life membership at the 50th Anniversary of the class in 2004. She was also in the display/demonstration team for 40 years and was part of the Executive of the Tasmanian Caledonian Council in the 1980s and 1990s, which ran the Highland Games.

In 1997 she gained her Teachers Certificate and was the first Tasmanian to gain the Certificate through the Australian Teachers Alliance.

Teaching and the arts in various forms have all featured strongly in Betty's life. She was invited to join the Launceston School for Seniors in 1989 'Singing for Pleasure Class' of which she is now the Coordinator. She teaches Scottish Country Dance Class for older people, became Secretary of the Launceston School for Seniors Committee in 1997 and served in that position for 21 years, having served on the committee for more than 23 years, being awarded life membership in 2015.

For some 15 years Betty was the secretary of various pipe bands. Liking to keep herself busy, she has been a volunteer radio operator in the control room of the Northern Ambulance Service, a Founding Member of the Northern Tasmanian Mini Car Club, an original Festivale Committee member when it first started in Launceston, and Secretary to the Board of Management responsible for building the Launceston Dowling Street Sports Centre.

While continuing to enjoy and contribute in many different spheres, Betty Laverty OAM is also currently the OAA Tasmania Branch's Northern Regional Group's secretary.

## KNOWING WHICH PIECE OF INSIGNIA TO WEAR



### Day Functions

The full-size insignia (Main Piece) is generally worn at day functions where decorations have been prescribed by the event, for example OAA Events or Anzac Day.

### Evening Functions

At events such as evening receptions and dinners where decorations have been prescribed, the miniature insignia is generally worn. The main exception to this is Neck Decorations (AC and AO), which are worn in full-size.

### Everyday Wear

A lapel pin may be worn on civilian clothes at any time. Only one badge should be worn at a given time and not when other insignia pieces are worn.

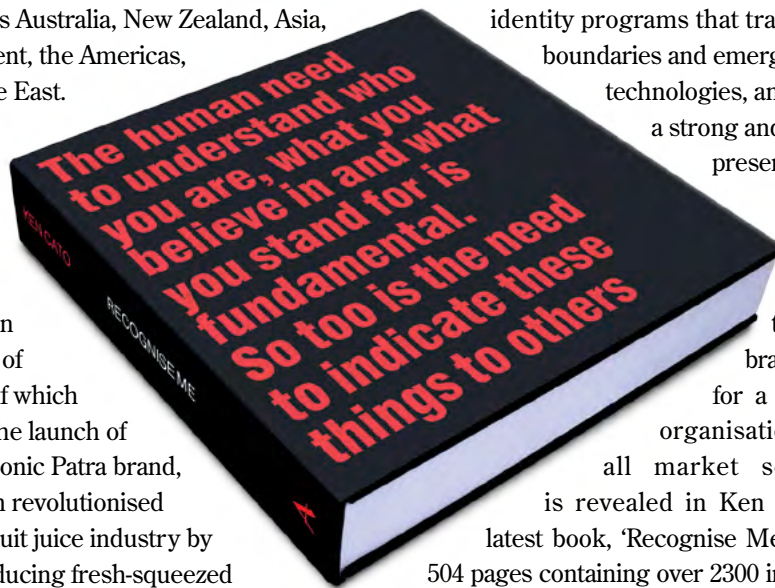

As the AGM for the WA Branch is set to be held on 25 February, with nominations called for a number of committee members as well as Branch Nominated Director, a list of current committee members has not been included in this report. Results of election will be posted on the web after the AGM. The focus for the new committee will be on both reflecting on the successes (or otherwise) of previous years and implementing initiatives and directions foreshadowed in the 2025 National Survey. Some of these changes were initiated in 2025, including what many believe was an outstanding and emotional visit to the Once Known Exhibition at the Old Perth Boys School, a part of the John Curtin Gallery, during NAIDOC Week.

In line with members' requests for a wider range of events and settings, the Branch's first Sundowner featured Professor Kingsley Dixon AO FTSE. His talk on biodiversity, held at the Cottesloe Golf Course in October, received great feedback. Professor Dixon has been recently awarded the honour of 2026 Senior Australian of the Year WA, and the Branch's 2026 calendar will feature a visit to his property in Waroona for a special guided tour of his nationally acclaimed Cypress Farm and Gardens.

The importance of regional events and the connections that they enable was also highlighted during the year. The recent lunch organised by the South-West Regional Group at Busselton attracted more than 70 people at the newly finished Hilton. The Mandurah lunch was another example of the importance of regional connections.

One programme that is unique to WA is the Branch's Police Patron Scheme. In this Branch members have the opportunity to become a Patron of squads of up-and-coming police officers undergoing training at the Police Academy. 2025 was a year of significant anniversaries for the Order and the Association and so it was for the Police Patron Scheme as it marked 25 years of operation and, through this, ongoing service to the WA community.

Another highlight was our visit in November to the Perth Hebrew Congregation. In the past our multi-faith-based events have been held in the Anglican Cathedral of Perth. To acknowledge the wider faith base of our membership and to reflect this in our activities, we were delighted to accept an invitation from Rabbi Lieberman and the Perth Hebrew Congregation Board of Management to a prayer service. The visit was generous in the sharing of information about the holy books and the service format. It was followed by dinner at Rabbi Lieberman's home prepared by his wife Liat. The WA Branch thanks the Perth Hebrew Congregation for organising this and will continue with its multi-faith outreach, as well as the continuation of events at St George's Cathedral.

Going back to the National Survey and how the new committee in the WA Branch will be responding: one of the central findings was that a diverse range of events and offerings, both formal and more informal, would be most welcome. In short, "mix it up a bit", but keep a combination of socialising, interesting speakers, good food along with a variety of venues and event timing. The committee will, I'm sure, look forward to delivering on that request. One of the most pleasing survey results was that WA responses showed that satisfaction with membership is high and such feedback is always warmly received.

## POLICE PATRON SCHEME

The Police Patron Scheme was inaugurated in October 2000, an initiative between WA Police and the Association's WA Branch that has proved very successful for the police and all the members of the WA Branch who have participated. Kevin Campbell AM was the first Patron at Maylands under the command of Police Superintendent, Chris Dawson, now our Governor. The commitment requires 28 weeks of involvement with a squad of new police recruits. At their graduation awards ceremony, the Patron of the WA Branch presents an award that is decided by the squad members. It was previously called the Good Samaritan Award and was awarded by the family of a long-serving and dedicated padre.

The WA Branch was given the privilege of presenting this award and in 2026 it has been renamed the Cassandra Chapman Courage and Integrity award. In 2024 Cassandra unfortunately died in a diving accident. As a junior officer she intervened in a domestic violence situation when a senior officer, her partner at the time, was abusing his police powers. Going against police culture, she reported the incident.

The current award criteria are: 'unselfish behaviour among peers; caring and compassionate; a recruit who will 'walk the extra mile' without question; one who supports the squad and maintains discipline and harmony within it. Proposed additional criteria: a recruit that demonstrates moral courage and integrity, therefore less about physical acts of bravery/courage but rather about ethical decision making when times

are tough and the chips are down; facing diversity and not going with the flow, but with what is right and just.'

### MUSIC, NOT WORDS: DR MARGARET PRIDE OAM

Dr Margaret Pride OAM was born in Perth, Western Australia, where in 1972 she obtained a BA (Mus) at the University of Western Australia. Margaret says that she expresses herself through music, not words.

Dr Pride began her professional life as a pianist and moved into teaching to earn enough money to study in England. She loved teaching so much that the England trip did not eventuate!

She did, however, study choral music and conducting for five years in the US, gaining her performance doctorate under Rodney Eichemberger at the prestigious University of Southern California. She is known worldwide and has conducted concerts and choirs in Europe, Japan, Southeast Asia, the US and across Australia.

Margaret continues to be a committed teacher, involved at times in schools and helping individual students at university and professional levels.

She developed a large orchestral and choral programme as Musical Director for Methodist Ladies College (1974 -1985). For nine years at the University of Western Australia, she was Senior Lecturer in Music, and Musical Director of Choral Studies. She was also Senior Lecturer at Edith Cowan University, and Music Director for the West Australian Symphony Orchestra Chorus for eight years. She has been state and national president of the Australian National Choral Association.

For more than 25 years, Margaret conducted the Perth Symphonic Chorus, Perth Baroque and Philharmonic Orchestras and Perth Collegium Musicum Choir. In recognition of her work as founding Music Director of the Perth Symphonic Chorus, and for initiating so many choirs and young singers, the Perth Symphonic Chorus set up the Margaret Pride Scholarship Fund to 'continue the ethos instilled by their founding director, by formally starting an avenue of supporting and providing mentorship and performance opportunities for singers in the difficult transition phase from tertiary study to professional work'.

From 2024 to 2025, Margaret lived in England, where she gave workshops and conducted concerts with professionals. In May 2025, she conducted an International Choir on Memorial Day Weekend in Carnegie Hall, New York.

The WA Branch is very grateful to Margaret who has arranged singers and orchestral players for several of our functions.

# GEORGINA GUBBINS OAM: FOR EVERY CHILD GROWING UP ON THE LAND

“Career coaches talk about having a plan - a roadmap to your dream role. But my journey has been anything but linear. I never set out to be a leader. And there was never a plan.”

The only plan that seemed to shape Georgina’s Gubbins’ early life was a career in nursing. Georgina’s professional life started as a remote area nurse. However, life

had other plans. She became an ‘accidental farmer’ a few years later. As life’s journey proceeded, Georgina found herself striving to build a productive modern farm and raising her daughters as a single mother.

Georgina’s learning curve was considerable and so too was the challenge of stepping into a man’s world: cattle and sheep farming.

Georgina points out that the system never made it easy, in fact, it was only in 1994 that women were even legally recognised as farmers in their own right. Before that, they were ‘non-productive sleeping partners’, ‘helpmates’, or simply ‘domestics’.

Georgina says that she became acutely aware that, to build a successful farm, she needed to balance science, data and stay in step with innovation. She learnt from undertaking research and formal studies, as well as through ‘pub talk’ and tapping into the farming community around her, despite the initial obstacles of being accepted.

“Farming is not just about watching the grass grow. It’s about understanding pasture systems, climate cycles, genetics, animal welfare, biosecurity and most importantly, business strategy.”

Georgina may not have planned to be a farmer, but she certainly proved she has all that it takes to carve out a remarkable journey in the sector. In addition to

establishing herself as a successful farmer, Georgina took on various roles such as panel advisory member for Meat and Livestock Australia, Australian Wool Innovation, and State Government bodies.

The ability to be strategic, responsive and resilient has ensured a life journey full of opportunities, alongside the hard work.

Georgina was awarded a Corporate Governance Scholarship from Meat and Livestock Australia to attend the Australian Institute of Company Directors Course. “At the time I was undertaking a Masters of Agriculture and things were a bit hectic, but I have a habit of grasping opportunities when they present themselves - and sometimes the timing isn’t great!”

Georgina not only forged a path for herself, but for women in farming and agriculture. “It’s been deeply rewarding to help shape research and innovation, to be at the forefront of innovation and to ensure that women’s voices are heard in agriculture,” she says. “Agriculture is not just about food. It’s about community, resilience, and innovation. It’s about feeding and clothing a nation, and doing it with care, science and pride. My honour is not just for myself, but for every woman who’s been underestimated, every farmer who’s faced hardship, and every child growing up on the land wondering what’s possible.”

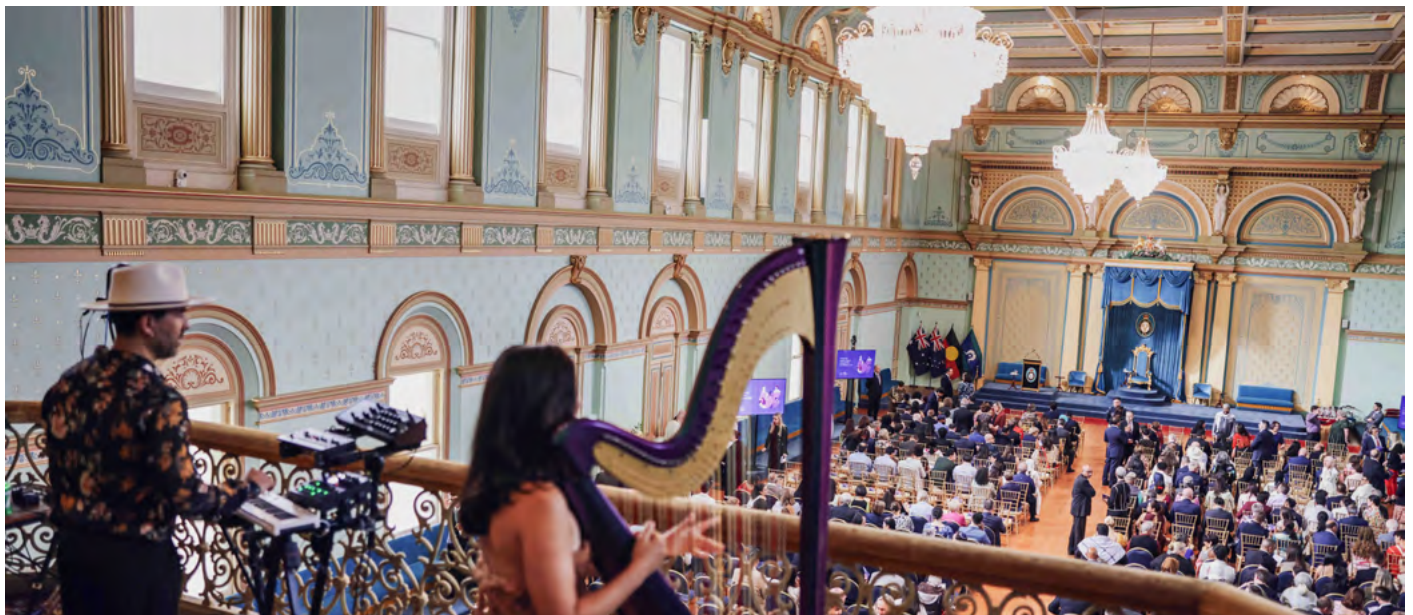

Eighty members attended our annual Australia Day Breakfast and celebrated the achievements of Australia Day awardees from the ACT and region. The guest speaker was Branch Committee member Dr Joe Johnson CSC OAM AAM, who had a long history of involvement with the Australian Antarctic Programme and spoke about some of the challenges of polar leadership and of the Antarctic and the Southern Ocean.

Guests enjoyed hearing the personal anecdotes of issues that arose over Joe's time as Station Leader at Casey and Davis

Bases, including relationships with Chinese and Russian stations. His leadership resulted in his receiving the Antarctic Medal in 2001 and the 2022 Phillip Law medal in recognition of his outstanding contribution to Antarctic affairs and the wider Antarctic Community, particularly for his station and voyage leadership; as Antarctic Names and Medal Committee Chairman and work in relation to the Antarctic Air link and service to the Australian National Antarctic Research Expeditions (ANARE) Club. Dr Johnson was awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia in 2020 for service to veterans, and to the community.

**FEATURED MEMBER**

**MAINUL HAQUE OAM: SERVICE, INCLUSION AND THE QUIET POWER OF COMMUNITY LEADERSHIP**

For ACT Branch Committee member Mainul Haque OAM, service has never been about titles or moments. It has been a lifelong commitment grounded in compassion, inclusion and responsibility to others. Across public service, community leadership, advocacy and governance, his work reflects a deep belief that strong communities are built through listening, collaboration and care for the most vulnerable.

Born in Bangladesh in 1964, Mainul's early life was shaped by values of education, faith and community responsibility. His father, a respected local leader, modelled *hilm* (forbearance) and *hikmah* (wisdom) in resolving community disputes with patience and dignity, lessons that would later define Mainul's own approach to leadership.

Awarded a Malaysian Government scholarship, Mainul studied Economics with a minor in Islamic Studies at the International Islamic University Malaysia, and later completed postgraduate studies in Economics in Canada before migrating to Australia in 1992. Mainul would dedicate more than 30 years of public service in Canberra across a range of central APS agencies and policy environments, including the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet and the Treasury. Throughout his career, he was widely regarded for his ability to bridge policy, community insight and practical outcomes.

Alongside his public service career, Mainul has made significant contributions through community leadership and governance. He has served numerous boards and advisory bodies, including the ACT Council of Social Service, the ACT Multicultural Advisory Council and the Health Care Consumer Association. Across these roles, he has brought a strong focus on accountability, ensuring diverse community voices are reflected in institutional processes.

His most visible community leadership role was as President of the Canberra Muslim Community from 2015 to 2019. He assumed the role at a time of significant challenge, with no local mosque, limited resources and a fragmented community. Through inclusive leadership, he brought together a diverse, multicultural committee, mobilised volunteers, and inspired contribution, shared ownership and collective effort. Within two years, the Gungahlin Mosque was completed and opened.

Under his leadership, the mosque emerged as a space of openness and engagement, hosting large community *iftars* and open days, welcoming neighbours, politicians, media, church groups and non-Muslim Australians, strengthening trust, understanding and social cohesion.

Beyond faith-based leadership, Mainul has been a strong advocate for inclusive public

policy, particularly for women and older Australians from multicultural backgrounds.

In recent years, he has focused on aged care for culturally and linguistically diverse communities. Drawing on both policy expertise and lived experience, he has championed co-design, stronger community partnerships and preventative approaches that support ageing with dignity and connection.

# PAMELA RAJKOWSKI OAM: A UNIQUE AWARD

The international Afghan association '8AM MEDIA', based in Canada, held its 2025 annual international awards ceremony in Melbourne on 7 December 2025, honouring individuals whose contributions have significantly shaped Afghanistan's arts, culture, human rights and innovation. The event is held to recognise the contributions of Afghans in Afghanistan and worldwide.

The 8AM Committee extraordinarily selected Pamela Rajkowski OAM to be the recipient of their 'Ghulam Muhammad Ghoobar' History Award, acknowledging more than 40 years of research and writing on the Afghan cameleers of Australia between 1860 and the 1920s.

The award is named after Ghulam Muhammad Ghoobar who was an academic, journalist, historical author and activist in Afghanistan from the 1910s to the 1930s, imprisoned for his views.

Pamela was presented with a trophy and certificate for her significant contribution *from pen to thought to paper* among the diverse creative Afghans in Australia and internationally. Pamela said, "It was such an honour for me on the day to be the only non-Afghan recipient among about 20 prominent Afghans coming up on stage to receive awards".

An SA Branch Committee member since 2020, Pamela is a South Australian research author, specialising in the history, heritage and contribution of the Australian Afghan cameleers. She has collaborated widely with Afghan cameleer descendants and has been a consultant to several state and national bodies, including the SA Museum, Adelaide City Council, Adelaide Cemeteries Authority, the Adelaide City Mosque and the National ABC Coasts series.

Pamela is the author of three published books. She was awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia in the 2008 Queen's Birthday Honours List, for *service to the community through research into the history of the Afghan and Aboriginal cameleers in Australia*.

Three years after the Foundation Board refreshed its strategy, and with the start of a new year, it is timely to report on progress that has been made.

Our purpose, reaffirmed in 2023, is “to support the next generation of leaders by helping promising young Australians achieve their potential for the benefit of future generations of Australians”.

Fundamental to the achievement of that purpose is the identification of exceptional second-year university students who have excelled academically, who have a strong track record of giving back to the community, who have a vision as to where they want to make a difference, and who will benefit from the financial support provided by a Foundation Scholarship. The selection process involves working with the relevant universities in a consistent and rigorous way to identify worthy awardees and then supporting them with a mentor from the Order of Australia who can provide guidance to maximise their career potential.

Over the past three years, 17 such extraordinary individuals have been identified. Full profiles of these individuals have been provided in past issues of *The Order* magazine. They include Ms Jennifer Corderoy from the University of New England, who wants to give back to the agricultural community from which she comes by helping improve sustainability, both through research and advocacy; Mr Ayman Miazhi, from Monash University, who is

The mentors for these and other awardees have been truly exceptional. They include Mr Tim Fairfax AC, The Hon. Michael Kirby AC CMG, Mr Nicholas Moore AO, The Hon Robert French AC, and the late Professor Emma Johnston AO. Attracting mentors of this quality has been integral to the Foundation’s efforts to ensure the potential of each awardee is fulfilled. We acknowledge and thank all mentors who have so willingly given of their energy and wisdom. The quality of their input is a guiding star to the mentees, with every effort being made to provide the best fit possible. From the awardees’ perspective, they describe the mentorship provided as being life-transformative.

Over the past three years, the Foundation has also worked assiduously with its partner universities to lift the rigour and consistency of the assessment process to attract and then select awardees. This has involved greater standardization of the process, as well as much greater engagement with each university. The strategic decision to increase the geographic diversity of states and universities from which scholars are drawn made this an imperative. Table 1 provides a snapshot of how the geographic spread from which awardees have come has changed from the end of 2022 to 2025.

The change in profile reflects the profile of donors, the Foundation Board’s desire to minimize travelling costs to attend the presentation dinner by increasing the proportion of awardees coming from the state where the Order of Australia Association Conference is being held, as well as a desire for greater geographic diversity. It is encouraging to see this increased diversification, while recognizing that more can still be done.

Despite there being no shift in the number of awardees coming from South Australia, the University of Adelaide remains the university with the highest number of awardees (10), followed by the University of Melbourne, University of Western Australia and Charles Darwin University (all with 5), and then the University of Sydney, University of NSW, Queensland University and University of Tasmania (all with 4).

Another significant change over the past three years has been the introduction of the Round Table Conference with the Governor-General at the time of the announcement of the awardees for that year. In 2023, it was held at Admiralty House in Sydney with His Excellency, the Hon. David Hurley AC and in 2024 with Her Excellency, the Hon. Sam Mostyn AC. In 2025, Her Excellency hosted the awardees at Government House in Canberra. The strong support of Their Excellencies for the Scholarship programme has immeasurably enhanced the prestige of the Scholarship. It provides a truly life-defining experience for the Scholars, helps attract broader national media coverage, as well as helping create a bond among each cohort of scholars. They have a real sense of sharing a lived common experience and the ideals of the Order of Australia. The Foundation is immensely grateful for the patronage and support of Their Excellencies.

Another strategic decision made in 2025 was to increase the value of the Scholarship to the awardee from \$40,000 to \$45,000, while holding funding for travel and other costs for each scholar constant at \$5,000. This decision by the Foundation Board was not taken lightly. It was consistent with the Board’s desire to maintain the prestige of the Scholarship against the backdrop of significant increases in the cost of living. The value of the Scholarship had not changed since the Scholarship was established in 2004.

The average number of Scholarships offered each year has more than doubled over the past three years from 2.57 Scholarships from 2004 to 2022 to 5.67 Scholarships from 2023 to 2025. As a result, the total average value of Scholarships funded each year has increased by 130 percent from \$102,800 to \$236,666.

None of this would have been possible without the generous support of our donors. That reflects increased support across the board for which we are immensely grateful. Table 2 shows how the donor support base has been broadened.

The support, not just of Foundation Board members, but also of the Order of Australia Association and the Branches, along with external individuals, has made a real difference.

Another indication of the growing strength of the Foundation is the increase in its reserves. Although, over the period 2023 to 2025, an all-time record of \$710,000 has been allocated to Scholarships, the Foundation’s corpus has grown by 94 per cent from \$2.58 million to just over \$5 million. This allowed us in 2025 to fund the first Scholarship from the Foundation’s corpus. We plan to do more in future.

In summary, the Foundation is going from strength to strength with a view to offering life-transformative Scholarships to exceptional individuals who have a real ability to make a difference to the future of Australia. This is a noble cause. We thank all our supporters, and we look forward to building on this momentum.
